

Beloved in Christ,

During the sermon on the last Sunday of October I shared a bit of Bishop Knisely's message from his address at Diocesan Convention the day before. In his address he talked about what the Gospel boils down to and what that calls out of us.

The Gospel, the good news of God in Christ, simply put, is that out of the unfathomable depths of God's love God has reunited us to Godself. Whether we talk about it terms of being saved, of being redeemed, or in any other way, it all boils down to God acting out of the depths of God's love in the person of Jesus Christ and doing for us what we are unable to do ourselves. To be clear this is all grace, this is all a free gift flowing out of God's love for us. It is not given because we have earned it or done anything to prove ourselves worthy or deserving of it, it is completely a free gift on God's part.

While it is freely given, with no question to our worthiness or if we deserve it, it does still call something out of us. That's an important distinction so I want to reiterate it. We do the things we do, we act the way we do, not to earn God's love and favor but in response to already have been given it. To say it another way, we do the things we do as Christians in thanksgiving for the love and grace we already know, not to earn that love and grace.

So what exactly does God's grace, God's love, call out of us? How do we show our thanksgiving for God's abundant, life-giving love? In his address at Diocesan Convention Bishop Knisely spoke about how what this calls out of us is simply to be kind. To be kind in every situation we find ourselves in. Again, just to be clear, we are not called to be kind in order to earn God's love and favor, but we do so in thanksgiving for it. If we mess it up real bad and are anything but kind we do not lose that love and favor, it has already been given to us. Being loved like that changes us though, and that's what I mean when I say that kindness is what is called out of us by the Gospel. My Systematic Theology professor in seminary used to say that no one can come to know the love of God in Jesus Christ and be left as they are. When we truly know God's love and grace we don't have to try so hard to be the kind people that the gospel calls out of us, because that very love and grace transforms us.



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 17, 2024, 3:00 PM


"An Afternoon of Masterworks and Hidden Gems for the Chamber Orchestra"

The program for COBSJ's November 17 concert is a very meaningful one. Johannes Brahms. Variations on a Theme by Haydn, op. 56 is a masterpiece from the orchestral literature, with revered variation and counterpoint techniques, and an exquisite treatment of melody. Gabriel Fauré's, Elegy, for Cello and Orchestra, op. 24, is also a staple in the literature for this instrument and will be performed by cello soloist, Theodore Mook, who has performed worldwide and resides in Rhode Island. Finally, Mayer's, Symphony No. 1 in C minor, written in 1847, is a true gem. Emilie Mayer, though she was an influential music figure in Berlin during the mid-19th century, remains unknown and this is a great opportunity for audiences in New England to experience a truly magnificent example of great orchestral writing from the Romantic era.

As our national politics ramp up with the election this month I want to bring this message to mind again. As Christians we are called to be kind. This isn't just Bishop Knisely's message, St. Paul shared it with the church in Ephesus nearly two thousand years ago. In the fourth chapter of the Letter to the Ephesians at the culmination of a passage detailing what it looks like to follow Christ we read, "and be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you."

Politics are front and center this month, but there are all sorts of voices coming at us making it harder and harder to be kind and tender-hearted. It's too easy to see that listening to those voices doesn't work though. It leads to more pain and brokenness. Bishop Knisely's message was not just pointing out that we are transformed into kinder people by God's love, but stressing how much the world needs us to be those kind and tender-hearted people. We see the pain and brokenness of the world too clearly wherever we look, we know it all too well. When we open ourselves to the transformation of God's Spirit, when we allow ourselves to become more kind and tender-hearted, allow ourselves to become more Christlike ourselves, we join in making the world a little bit better, a little more bit like God intended it to be.

Those voices that make it harder to be kind and tender-hearted seem to get louder in these election cycles and that is why it is so important that we live into our calling to be those kind, tender-hearted people. Imagine how much better the world would be ordinarily if we all fully lived into that calling, now imagine how much more impactful that would be around this election.

This November, let us remember that as God's beloved children we are called to live lives worthy of the gift we've been given, we are called to be kind, and tender-hearted to everyone we meet, in everything we do.
